Much has happened since the last Newsletter. We have survived another winter. This one included some white stuff. If I remember correctly, it is called SNOW!!! The change in seasons has brought us all the beautiful azaleas and made us look forward to warmer weather.

On a big note, we have encountered a change in our community leadership. In January, Frank and Pat D'Amato moved to be closer to family in North Carolina. We are all grateful for the outstanding service Frank gave to this community over the last 2 decades. It will be difficult to replace all his knowledge and experience. When he left the community lost a fulltime (unpaid and over-worked) employee. Thanks, Frank, for making this the best community on the South Strand.

I am very happy to report that we filled the Board of Director position made available with Frank's departure. After reviewing the resumes provided by the candidates, the Board of Directors appointed an extremely qualified individual, David Philips. Dave is well known in the community and has been a contributor for many years in a variety of positions in Tradition and Pawley's Island. Next time you see Dave thank him for his willingness to serve the community.

Speeding within the community – We continue to experience speeding vehicles throughout the community. Our speed limit is 25 miles per hour. One area of specific concern is the corner of Tradition Club Drive and Deacon Drive near the front gate. Please be mindful of the homes nearby as you accelerate after making the turn onto Deacon Drive.

As you know an Eblast was sent out regarding speeding in our community. I received many thanks for mentioning it. It seems to be a bigger concern than I thought. I have received some input into other areas which should be mentioned. The intersection of Deacon Drive and Tradition Club Drive seems to be hazardous as well. Many people do not come to a complete stop. This is dangerous for 2 reasons, one, we need to be sure no one is traveling on TCD. Secondly there are golf carts crossing the street at that intersection. Please proceed cautiously when nearing the intersection and please come to a complete stop. Another area of concern is TCD as we near the back gate. The street is wider and this seems to encourage drivers to accelerate. Please remember the speed limit is still 25 MPH throughout the community. Please follow the speed limit and keep our residents, walkers and bikers safe.

Golf Course Properties - With the influx of new residents into our great community, the golf course superintendent wants to remind all homeowners who live on the golf course of a few things.

Please do not clear any vegetation on golf course property.

In the past a homeowner had to pay for new small trees after they cut some down on golf course property.

Please be aware that the white plastic stakes you see are the "out of bounds" stakes **not the property line.**

Golf course property extends another 10 feet toward your property. Please do not disturb or landscape these areas.

If you have any questions about property lines, contact the Pro Shop and they will get you in touch with Shawn Keller, the superintendent.



Community Projects—Now that spring has arrived, it is time to begin our spring cleanup. You have already received the Eblast and the flyer reminding everyone of some of the items to be aware of.

Please take the time to address these items to keep our community beautiful.



Fountain in the Front gate pond – We have been experiencing some issues with this fountain. After attempting a fix, we learned the motor was worn and beyond repair. A new fountain and light package has been ordered. Upon delivery, it will be installed and up and running once again.

Sewer Cleaning – Many of you have probably been wondering what those trucks have been doing along Tradition Club Drive. That was the Georgetown County Water Sewer District cleaning and repairing the sewer lines. There were a number of areas where the pipes were deteriorating and a sleeve was placed in the pipe to repair them. It is quite a process using vacuums and 180-degree water to clean the pipes and secure the sleeves. We were not able to alert you of the upcoming work as GCWSD does not inform us when they are coming.

Back Gate Pumping Station - GCWSD has a pumping station near our back gate. From time to time it is used as a staging area for our maintenance staff. The white gate at the entrance was damaged and has been removed. Additional plantings will be added to help hide the facility, however, there must be an opening to allow GCWSD vehicles access. Some time ago a fresh water intake was clogged by storm debris and overflowed into the discharge pipe. The backup caused the pump station to clog, leaving a strong swamp smell. GCWSD did a full system pressure flush of the line, and removed the debris, mud, and sediment eliminating the odor.

Deteriorating pipes - One of the major issues we encounter is deteriorating underground drainage pipes. When one is encountered, a sleeve of a slightly smaller size is inserted into the pipe to seal it. When these issues take place under someone's lawn, a sink hole occurs. We currently have multiple sink holes in some back yards along Tradition Club Drive. We have contracted with a company to fix these pipes. Unfortunately, reduced staff due to COVID has delayed these fixes. Work is expected to begin soon. The homeowners being impacted will be contacted to alert them of the upcoming activity on their property. A drainage issue on Historic Lane is also being looked into to prevent future drainage water flowing above ground.

Pool – Our last newsletter article informed you that we needed to find a new pool contractor. We have hired Goodwin's Pool Service who specializes in Ionization filtering systems. They have been on the job since January and are doing a great job. The pool is open all year, however, the chairs and umbrellas are stored during the colder months. Since we have seen an improvement in temperatures our maintenance team has prepared the deck for the season. Remember to close the umbrellas when leaving the pool to prevent damage from high winds.



Landscaping – Mulch and pine straw have already been spread throughout the community.

Tree debris cleanup - In one of the recent windy days, a large branch snapped but is still attached to the tree. Unfortunately, it is hanging over the sidewalk on Tradition Club Drive near the cross over between the first and second holes. Upon further investigation, it was determined that the tree itself is dying. The tree is being removed.

Storms - If we have a severe storm the association will make sure streets are open and we will assist homeowners in the clean-up. However, small storms and damage to personal property lies with the property owner. It is a homeowner's responsibility to clean the debris from their trees that go into our streets. You or your lawn people need to blow the streets clean and pick it up for disposal. You must make sure the debris is not blown down street drains or we will have issues with flooding during storms. We own our streets and we do not have a street department.

We live in a special community. It is so special because of the wonderful people who live here. We have so many activities to participate in which takes a lot of work. I would like to thank all those volunteers who run the activities as well as the members of the Social Committee, Covenants Committee, the ARB as well as members of the BOD for all their efforts. Your efforts make us who we are.

When you get an email blast from Vince Franco regarding Board of Director Communications. Please do not respond to Vince, contact the board member sending the message.



The Tradition Annual Meeting was held on February 24, at the Waccamaw Public Library. It was very well attended. Below are questions that were posed by the audience during the open discussion session.

Resident's Phone Books – Issued raise regarding security of disposal of old books. Recommended that they be shredded.

Outdated Covenants – Request to remove things from old covenants if no longer needed

Our response: Indicated that is part of the task we are currently doing as we review all covenants as well as the Architectural Review Board requirements. Some items are required due to what is contained in the legal documents. We indicated some items may require a vote and we would keep the residents informed of any changes.

Back Gate Safety –Curves make it difficult to see. The bushes on the berm are trimmed to provide the best view possible. We will contact the Georgetown Sheriff's department to try to better manage the speed of the oncoming traffic.

Spectrum – When is Spectrum contract up?
Answer given: End of 12/31/2024

Alexander Glennie & TCD – Georgetown Pumping State site; when will following be done?

Fix the fence (we indicated Tradition is responsible for this and looking into it)
Landscaping – (Agree we need to address this when repairs complete, but also need to recognize county needs to get in and out.)

Sewage Odor – Getting worse (we agreed to look into it)
(All above covered in the President's report)

Historic Lane Drainage– Concern regarding drainage (We indicated a new reserve study is being contracted with a separate company that will include review of roads and drainage.)

What are Pool "passes" – Kuester cleared up this confusion, they mis referenced the term in their documentation, as we have "keys" which the homeowners receive and manage.

Rental of Street Lights—Questioned if we were still renting street lights. (We indicated we are but working with 2 other POAs. While we are not the lead, it is taking some time to get a resolution on this issue and is still in process.)

Community Sing Along and Farewell

to Frank and Pat D'Amato was held in December. The event was well attended, with great Christmas Music, food and comradery. A presentation was given by John McLaughlin recognizing Frank D'Amato's 18 year reign on the BOD followed by a slide show video of Frank and Pat throughout the years.

Pool Use Reminders

- ◆ Persons using the facility do so at their own risk
- ◆ All swimmers must take a shower before entering the pool
- ◆ Children under 12 must be accompanied by an adult.
- ◆ No running or jumping
- ◆ Plastic containers only, no glass permitted in pool area
- ◆ Appropriate attire will conform to conventional swimsuits
- ◆ Floats, except for swimming aids, are not permitted in the pool
- ◆ Adults and children in diapers must wear state approved pool diapers
- ◆ Pets are forbidden in the pool area
- ◆ The use of radios is discouraged
- ◆ Each resident has a pool key, please do not open the gate for others

Pool hours are 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.

The Tradition pool is a private pool. You must be a current Tradition property owner, renter or a visiting family member to use the pool on your own. Visiting guests MUST be accompanied at the pool. Please respect the hours of operation and rules so that all residents can enjoy a safe and healthy pool environment.

A story: I was driving a golf cart through the neighborhood a couple of weeks ago on a Sunday afternoon. As a car pulled up behind me I moved over to let them pass. They slowed and rolled down the window and asked "What neighborhood is this?" LITCHFIELD BEAUTIFICATION FOUNDATION

Below is an excerpt from the LBF board response to the Coastal Observer November 25th story reporting on the Georgetown County accommodations tax grant process. The article contained a quoted comment from the chairperson of the Accommodations Tax Advisory Committee “We are reaching the point where we are spending hundreds of thousands of dollars to mow grass.”

The unique history of the Litchfield Beautification Foundation can be found on our website (lbf29585.com). Suffice to say that for 14 years LBF has maintained 4.1 miles of the median strip and shoulders on Highway 17 from Martin Luther King Drive to just north of Sandy Island Road. During the year LBF performs the following functions in the Highway 17 median and shoulders that are under our care:

- Edging of beds and medians
- Weed control with chemicals and hand-removal
- Replacing and renewing mulch twice per year around trees and shrubs
- Applying insecticides and fertilizers annually
- Trimming and pruning all the trees, shrubs, and grasses – done seasonally to promote natural growth and to preserve safe sight lines for traffic
- Removal of dead, damaged or decayed plant material (including trees) and replacement with like species
- Hydroseeding are spots that arise
- Yes, weekly grass cutting and edging
- Perhaps most noticeable, daily trash pick-up which includes litter, leaves, limb and other debris.

We also respond to catastrophic events such as floods, hurricanes and traffic accidents that damage the shoulders or the median. The LBF Board supervises all these activities to make sure they are done in a timely, professional and cost-effective manner.

Our operations budget runs around \$130,000 per year. The board of LBF through our constant fund-raising efforts and the incredible amount of public spirit on behalf of our main donor base (individuals, HOAs, POAs, and businesses) is fortunate enough to raise around 80 percent of this budget. The remaining 20 percent or so has been provided in the last several years by a grant from Georgetown County accommodations tax. It is also noteworthy that these wonderful grants are specifically earmarked for maintenance. These funds are not expended for any other aspect of LBF’s operations.

LBF is proud of the truly “public-private” union we have maintained with Georgetown County for the last several years. We genuinely hope to continue what has been a very fruitful partnership for all parties concerned. LBF believes that your readers will understand our concern that a member of the Accommodations Tax Advisory Committee would mischaracterize our mission as just cutting grass.

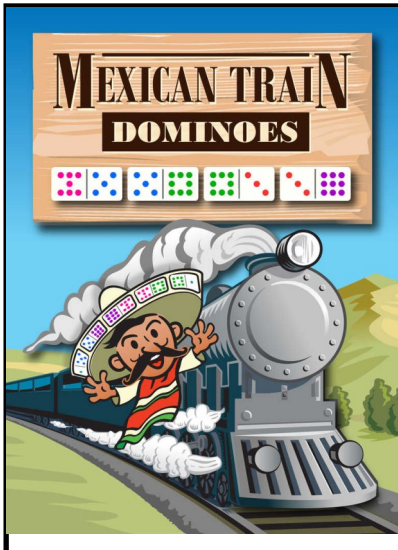

Spring into Action Checklist for Homeowners

Inspect for RUST, MILDEW, MOLD and Overall Cleanliness:

- House Siding Driveway Curb/Gutter Sidewalk

Inspect your LAWN, SHRUBBERY, and TREES for:

- Mowing & Edging of all grassy areas (see Sidewalks note below) *
- Lawn thinning & bare spots that need improvement (fertilizer, pest control, irrigation)
- WEED CONTROL for grassy areas, beds, and shrubs
- Bedding areas in need of EDGING ... and MULCH or PINE STRAW
- Trees and shrubs that need attention (see Wetlands Buffer note below) **
- Branches and shrubs that overhang house or sidewalk and require pruning or trimming
- Overall cleanup of yard debris, branches, dead leaves

Inspect your MAILBOX & POST:

- Post repair needed? (Vendors to help are listed on The Tradition website)
- Post paint needed? (Tradition formula available at Sherwin Williams, PI or Murrells Inlet stores)
- Mailbox paint needed? (Black spray enamel)
- Remove RUST, MILDEW, MOLD and bird droppings
- Are House Numbers posted on both sides of paper box? (Must be 3-4" high per Fire Dept.)

* **Sidewalks where applicable:** You are responsible for the cleaning and upkeep of the sidewalk and grass borders that adjoin your front property line.

Curbs & gutters – All properties: Every homeowner/renter is responsible for removing debris and cleaning the concrete gutters that connect your driveways and perimeter property lines to the asphalt edge of the street. Keeping these areas free of debris is crucial to eliminate flooding during hurricane season!

** **Wetlands Buffer:** If the section of your property that needs attention falls within the Wetlands Buffer, *before taking any action*, please consult a member of the Covenants committee or the ARB. Please consult your plat for buffer lines.

When you first saw Tradition, you probably thought *this looks like a great place to live!* Properties here are sought after because most homeowners take good care of their properties. It is an investment worth maintaining!

When each of us “signed on the dotted line” to purchase our property—simultaneously each of us became a member of the Tradition Property Owners Association (POA).

Your signature was a legal commitment to comply with the rules set forth in the Association’s governing documents (the bylaws and the covenants, conditions and restrictions). You are responsible for assuring that your family members, guests, and renters comply also.

The Covenants Committee: Who we are and What we do

We are your neighbors.

And as homeowners, we volunteer our time to “Keep Tradition Beautiful” by assuring compliance with Tradition’s bylaws, covenants guidelines, and ARB guidelines.

Regularly scheduled external inspections are conducted by committee members, each assigned to a section of streets within Tradition.

The inspection checklists are reviewed at the committee’s monthly meetings.

If a compliance issue is identified, the homeowner will receive a dated notice describing the issue(s) and requests prompt resolution.

Spring into Action: Be your own inspector.

First, refresh your knowledge of Tradition’s compliance requirements. Read your printed Tradition handbook

Covenants Guidelines and the updated (2020) *Fine Schedule*.

When you identify an issue on your property, please address it promptly.

A property that has fallen out of compliance will trigger a friendly “nudge” from the Covenants committee or BOD (the dated notice mentioned in the previous section).

Questions?

Knowing where to start or how to proceed is not always easy. We are here to guide you! Please contact any board member to discuss your issue, and do not hesitate! An issue left unresolved can ultimately lead to a fine or worse.

As volunteers, we appreciate your prompt attention to the first “nudge” from our committee.

As neighbors and fellow members of the Tradition POA, we expect everyone to respect and honor their commitment to compliance.

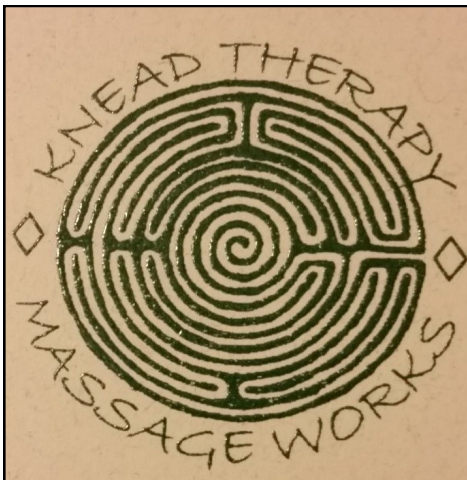

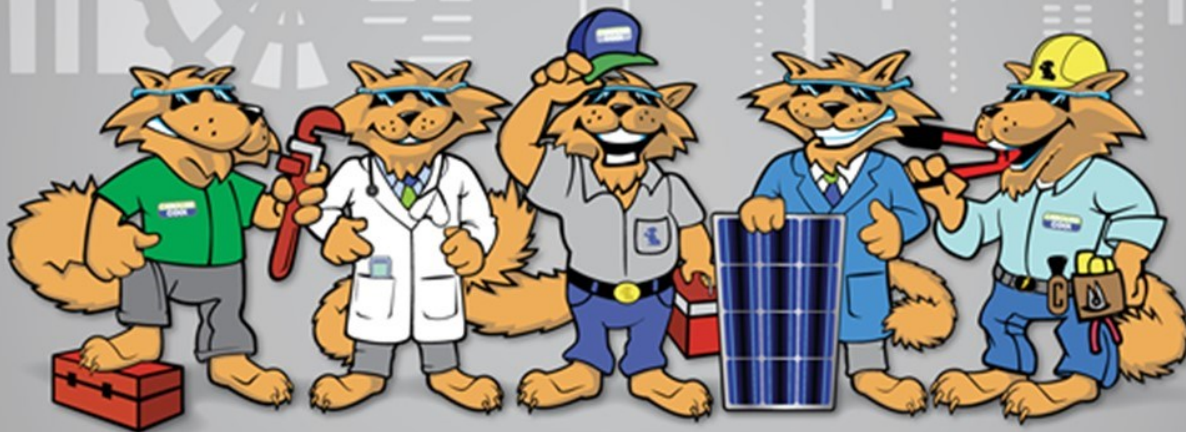
