HELP OUR STATE REPTILE

THE SEA TURTLE

Minimize beach lighting from May through October. Beach lighting confuses the endangered Sea Turtles as they return nightly during the summer nesting season to South Carolina's beaches.

Artificial lighting, street lights, house or condominium lights, and even flashlights confuse the female accustomed to darkness—and they will not nest. Turtle hatchlings' instincts attracts them to lights instead of the ocean, and they wander about, too weak to swim, and fall prey to predators or the heat of the sun. When "turtle watching," keep some distance, and don't stand between them and the ocean.

We can help to minimize lighting near or on the beach during nesting and hatching season. Encourage everyone you know, including visitors, to help maintain South Carolina's beaches as a suitable habitat the the endangered loggerhead sea turtles and their young.


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Low-Impact Aerobics News

But now that warm weather is here, we are all getting busy with other outdoor activities, so it is time to end our sessions until fall when we will look for indoor tone-up once again.



The Architectural Review Board is pleased to report meaningful progress with clearing infractions—which is an ongoing process.

As stated in its Annual Report in February, the ARB is convinced that the vast majority of violations were unintentional. Once owners realized they were in conflict with the Covenants, they were quick to remedy violation conditions.

Nearly thirty letters have been sent out by the Property Manager so far, and almost every one resulted in corrective action by homeowners.


