We are thrilled that we have so many caring neighbors. Thanks to all!!!



#### From the TPOA President's Corner By Dick Hajec, President TPOA

We have all just witnessed a Presidential Election that was flawed and will, hopefully, never be conducted the same way in the future. Many voters felt disenfranchised and many others were not even interested in casting their vote. So, with this in mind, please take the time to exercise your right to vote for your TPOA Board of Directors in our forthcoming Annual Election process. We will be electing two new members to the BOD this year. These new Directors will serve on the Board for three years and will join Ron Brugge, Moe Blais, and Bill Hartis as your BOD for the next year. The Nominating Committee has presented the current BOD with nine names from which two will be elected. Please submit your proxy vote via mail or vote in person at the Annual Meeting on February 22, 2000. Your vote is important.

Each of us should have already received the 2001 Operating Budget and by now have probably reviewed this budget for changes from the 2000 Budget. Two changes should have been obvious - a reduction in our regime fee from \$47/month to \$42/month and an increase in our overall cost of operation. Both were possible because we are now a "Sold Out" community of 405 lots and our expenses can be covered by this lower fee structure. Also, our year 2000 income was adequate to allow your BOD to bring the Reserve Accounts current.

Our financial condition is very healthy. The BOD and the Building and Grounds Committee have begun obtaining quotes to upgrade the condition of our "Common Properties" during 2001 by utilizing prior excess funds that are presently in TPOA interest bearing bank accounts. We plan to irrigate and grass these areas and also reorganize some of the planting to allow for more efficient mowing in the future. No firm date has been set, but I expect the work will be timed effectively to take advantage of proper growth periods.

Georgetown County properties were reassessed in 2000 and I suspect that all of us have ended up paying significantly higher property taxes on our homes. This is both a sign of the times and the fact that our property value has indeed increased over the past several years. Maybe we should all be happy about this situation since increased value certainly beats losses in property value.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the committee heads and their committee members for their time and efforts over the past year. We are very fortunate to have neighbors that are willing to volunteer their time and efforts to make the Tradition an active and affordable community to live in. I trust it will continue to remain so in the future.

Happy New Year to everyone and I hope to see most of you at the Annual Meeting on February 22.

#### **COMMON AREAS**

According to the surveys returned to the TOPCC, a great many members are concerned about the condition of the common areas of our community. We are faced with a number of hurdles in getting these lunch, tax and gratuity, bus transportation, and areas in proper condition. As you know, most of these areas are not irrigated and the past dry summer has taken a toll on them. Our former landscape company did little to help that situation. After considerable negotiating by the Building and Grounds Committee, our Board of Directors has approved and signed a new contract for maintenance of the common areas. Additional money was approved for extensive pruning needed to improve the two entrances and club house area along with planting seasonal color. Unfortunately the cold spell we experienced has prevented the color from reaching it's full potential.

#### IRRIGATION SYSTEMS

Building and Grounds is presently receiving bids on irrigating all of our common areas. This is a large undertaking that we feel is necessary if we are to avoid the damage that can be done by future dry spells. This should be completed before further improving these areas. All this will take some time to accomplish, but we hope you can see and appreciate the changes already made.

#### **CURBING REPLACEMENT**

Replacement of damaged curbs is completed. If a few small areas were missed, we are sorry, but the general feeling is that Centex has done more than we expected.

The responsibilities of the Building and Grounds Committee are more extensive than many residents realize. With the roads, buildings, pool, tennis courts and common areas we impact a large portion of the Club's annual budget, but we are only an advisory committee to the Board of Directors. It is the Board of Directors who must approve what we attempt to accomplish. If you support our endeavors, or have your own concerns, let them be known to us and to the Board Members. Soon you will be asked to elect two new Board members. Get to know the candidates and their positions. Vote responsibly so that we can continue to make The Tradition a better place to live.


pieces of art, ranging from sculpture to Sumi-e Chinese Brush Painting.

Bill was born and raised in New York City as part of an outgoing family who sang and danced in amateur theater productions. Upon graduation from Mount St. Michael's HS in New York, Bill fleetingly considered trying to break into the theater and television. However, the Korean conflict put his dreams on hold for many years.

After one year at Fordham University, Bill enlisted in the Army and did his basic training at Fort Knox, KY. Of the 200 men in his basic training group, all but three were sent to Korea – Bill was one of the three to stay in the States. Next he was stationed at Fort Benning, GA where he met Jeanette. After completing his stint in the service, Jeanette and Bill were married and settled in Atlanta. They have one son who is a chef at Frank's Restaurant in Pawleys Island.

He earned his undergraduate degree from Georgia State, taking all his classes in the evening while holding down a full-time position. His Masters in Administration from Cal State was obtained some 20 years later, also by attending night classes.

Bill's entire business career was in Sales and Marketing. His first position at Procter and Gamble introduced him to the fast-paced marketing of such products as Crest toothpaste, Prell shampoo and Secret deodorant. His career included 11 years at Vanity Fair, working in Atlanta, Indianapolis, running the Los Angeles sales office, and finally in New York City. Other positions included National Sales Manager for Totes Rainwear, VP of Sales and Marketing for Kayser-Roth Apparel, and finally his own sales organization as a Manufacturers Rep for Enesco, importers of fine giftware. In the course of his various positions, Bill and Jeanette moved across the country eight times, the last move being to Pawleys Island.

In the spring of 1998, and for the following two years, Bill assumed chairmanship of the Tradition Social Club, and together with Jeanette and Suzanne and Tom Strasser, initiated the semi-annual dances, bingo and several bus trips to Charleston. He presently is the Secretary of the Tradition Men's Golf Club and is on the Board of Directors of the Waccamaw Neck Civic Association.

Both Jeanette and Bill are active members of Precious Blood Church in Pawleys Island where they participate in the Meals on Wheels Program. Bill is also a Lector and a member of the Knights of Columbus. In spite of all the activities in which the Renaults are involved, Bill has finally been able to do the theater work that he put on hold many years ago.

Bill is a member of the Murrells Inlet Community Theater, where he is on the Board of Directors and Treasurer. He recently performed in "Lovers and Other Strangers" as Hal, and "The Night of January 16" in which he portrayed an eccentric millionaire. He has just completed "The Golden Age of Radio" at the Grand Strand Senior Center, where he portrayed Bud Abbott in the famous "Who's on First" skit. He also played Kenny Baker on the Jack Benny Hour and participated in a spoof on soap operas called "Garish Summit," in which he portrayed the son of a dowager. In March, he will be back with the Murrells Inlet group in "Other People's Money – The Ultimate Seduction."

Bill says he never gets nervous prior to a performance – that it is always fun. He feels that without the pressures of the business world, he is able to totally immerse himself into the character he is playing.

Throughout their 45 years of marriage, Jeanette has been Bill's biggest fan, being completely supportive of all he does. They are a delightful couple and it is a pleasure to have them as part of our community.


#### Road Maintenance District By Dick Albright

Discussions continue on ownership of the extension of Kings River Road between Willbrook Blvd. and Sandy Island Road, past the new Middle School. Litchfield Company's Mike Mahon and Rick Ryan and other Road District Board Members met with Georgetown County Planner, Al Burns. Litchfield Company is building the road and wants to turn over maintenance responsibility to the county/state rather than to the Road Mainte-Ultimately we nance District (our goal too). would also like to see maintenance responsibility for Willbrook Blvd. and Kings River Road (south of Willbrook) taken over by the county/state with the Road Maintenance District retaining beautification responsibility.

Also at issue are turning and deceleration lanes on Willbrook at the new school road. Mr. Burns stated that the issues are financial as well as political. Three of Georgetown Counties seven Councilmen (Charlton, Hood, and Swatzel) live on the Neck and a meeting with them to gain their support is planned. We, as a community, must become proactive in this issue. Personal contact and letters to Council Members as well as the School Board (safety of school buses on a privately maintained road) will be needed. The first step is getting the county/state to assume responsibility for the new road.

Repair and update of signage along Willbrook Blvd. is under contract and work is anticipated in March.

Habitat for Humanity recently held their annual Brickholders Meeting. This meeting recognized the hard work of their volunteers during this past year. Many of our neighbors here at the Tradition were thanked for their efforts. The areas they worked in were: Fund Raising, Tour of Homes, the Golf Outing Fund Raiser, Construction, Office Help, Selection Committee, and overall general volunteering. 
#### **Our Midway Fire Department**

Midway Fire Department was organized in 1961. Its first location was on Route 17 in Pawleys Island near the Shell Station. The district that this department covers extends from the Georgetown bridges to the beginning of Murrells Inlet. The first Department was comprised of all volunteers. Mike Mock, who is now Fire Chief, was the first paid employee, and the joined the Department in 1978. The Midway Station, our neighbor, was completed in 1989, just in time for Hurricane Hugo, which delivered a devastating blow to the east coast.

The new station suffered only minimal damage (a few roof shingles) so the firefighters and their volunteers turned it into an emergency center for our area. The station became a shelter and a place where more than 600 people, including policemen from other areas, could find a meal. The Midway force worked for weeks with the recovery effort, because of so much damage. There were many downed power lines as well as gasoline cylinders and other hazardous debris floating around, all of which had to be carefully handled.

Today, the Midway Fire Department has two additional substations, "82" in the True Blue section and "83" in the Debordieu area, manned by 47 full time employees and 24 volunteers. Twelve volunteers are in charge of on-site jobs, such as setting up resting areas for the firefighters when there is a particularly large fire, taking photographs of the fire scenes, doing administrative duties, including reports about the emergencies. The remaining twelve volunteers are part of the fire crews, joining in fighting fires, and helping with medical emergencies and accidents. Chief Mock stresses that volunteers are always needed and are sufficiently trained. Current volunteers include several retired individuals as well as a married couple.



All firefighters are EMT's (emergency medical technicians) and include twelve paramedics. These additional standards have been in effect in Pawleys Island since 1986. Last year, Midway answered 1560 calls, of which 65% were medical calls, 15% were fire emergencies, and 20% were miscellaneous accidents, including motor vehicles.

The Pawleys Island Rescue Squad is separate from the Fire Department and has its primary location at Station 82. However, our main fire station has a Rescue Squad vehicle there at all times. This squad is in addition to the fire department's paramedics and EMT personnel. The Rescue Squad, because it is a separate unit, is entirely supported by donations.

In addition to its other duties, Midway provides an extensive educational program for children and seniors. For children, the department has rebuilt and refurbished a 1962 fire engine. It is decorated for children to explore and climb into it. The crew visits schools and other interested places with the truck and also presents a puppet program about fire prevention and safety. Last year about 3000 children and seniors benefited from the program. In 1999, the Midway Fire Department won the South Carolina Fire Education award.

Tradition Residents are fortunate to have such a professional, dedicated, fire department nearby.
