From the TPOA President's Corner By Ron Brugge, President TPOA

I would like to remind every homeowner to mark down February 21 as a date to set aside so that you can attend the Tradition Homeowners annual meeting. We have 405 homeowners and most live here. In the past, only about 25% have attended the annual meetings. It is important that we have a quorum either in person or by proxy. Again, in the past we have had around 52% to make up the quorum. As you can see, only about one half of the homeowners are involved. Make this year an exception. Please plan to attend or mail in your proxy. The formal notice with the proxy will be mailed around the first of February.

I would like to use this newsletter to thank all of those who volunteered their time to make Tradition a better place to live. The Building and Grounds, chaired by Walt Murren, spent hours making sure the irrigation system was installed correctly along with the sod work. A storm sewer survey was completed so that we can plan for the future as to what repairs will be needed. These are just a couple of the many items that this committee handled.

The Architectural Review Board (ARB), chaired by Tom Hicswa, stayed busy assisting homeowners in their planned house alterations. This can be a very difficult task with different issues every month. If you take a slow drive through the community, I think you will see the results of this committee's work. It is neat and the alterations that have been made are according to good standards.

The Covenants Committee, chaired by Rachel Coletti, has a very thankless task. This committee looks into portable-type items, and the ARB looks mainly into structures that are permanent. Again, while some may not agree with them on 100% of the items, I think everyone will agree with them on at least 90%. We live in a very compact development. The lots are small and the houses are close together, so all of us should consider this in our planning.


The Social Committee is chaired by Suzanne Strasser. She schedules the homeowners clubhouse and plans many social events for the entire community, including golf activities, dances, and bingo.

Some questions have come up over how to obtain a copy of the covenants. Each homeowner should have received a copy at their closing. If you did not, you should know that each property owner is responsible to follow the covenants whether or not they have a copy. If you do not have a copy, you can either make a copy of a friend's copy, or you can obtain a copy for a \$35 fee from Tom Finley at Chicora, 272-1123. If you are planning alterations or property changes and are not sure about the covenants, it is best to call members of the ARB or Covenants Committee and check it out.

The nominating committee has selected two candidates who will run for the position open on the Board of Directors. The Board approved their recommendation at the October meeting. The candidates are Ron Mokrynka and Ginni Swenson. You will receive more about these candidates in the annual meeting notice. We are lucky to have two individuals that are very active and interested in our community. Please show your support and plan to attend the annual meeting on February 21st.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE Walter E. Murren

It's always nice to write a report about the progress we are making to improve our association, our facilities and our common areas. It's great to be able to thank the members who step forward and offer their time and energy towards the good of the community and we will continue to give them the personal recognition they deserve. However, there are times when we will have to speak out about things that are done, either thoughtlessly or on purpose, that are to the detriment of the community. One such incident happened recently, when a load of excess concrete was dumped into a conservation area. There is no place in the entire community for the dumping of construction waste, garden waste or any other household waste. If you are having work done at your residence, all work must be done on your property. There is to be no mixing of concrete or storing of supplies on community roads or property, and you must provide for the proper disposal of leftover materials. We would appreciate it if the party responsible for this dumping would come forward and see that it is cleaned up. In the future, if anyone is seen dumping in common or conservation areas, they will be required to clean the area and will be subject to a fine by the Board of Directors. We remind you that disturbing the conservation areas is a violation of Georgetown County ordinances. We also ask all our membership to be diligent in reporting any violations to the Building and Grounds Committee or the Board of Directors.

The TRADITION, while part of the unincorporated area of Georgetown County, is in a sense a small community unto itself. We own and are responsible for all our roads, storm sewer system, drainage ponds, streets signs, entrance bridge, common grounds, irrigation systems, buildings, pool and tennis courts. While we don't collect taxes, a portion of your dues must go to providing a fund for the current and future maintenance of all these assets. In this regard HOWARD KRAUTH has worked diligently with professionals in various fields to determine what our future costs will be to maintain our property so that proper funding will be available to the Building and Grounds Committee when necessary with, of course, the approval of the Board of Directors. Our deep appreciation to Howard for all the work involved.

Our STREET SIGNS are showing a need for repair and lawn weed wackers are inflicting severe damage to the base of most posts. If a post is on your lawn, use care in cutting around the base. Removing 4 to 5 inches of grass from around the bottom of the sign pole will help prevent damage. We will be looking for volunteers to help repair the bases come spring. If interested call JIM CONWAY or me. Report any missing or damaged signs to Building and Grounds

The TENNIS COURTS were resurfaced in the spring of 1998 and we are keeping them in good playing condition. My thanks to GEORGE WILSON who helped me in sealing all the minor cracks that have developed. Let's make more use of the courts. Check this newsletter for whom to call.

While spring is still a few months away, we want to remind you of our annual SPRING CLEAN UP. If you only volunteer once a year, that is a good time to do it and meet some of your neighbors at the same time. Keep it in mind for a Saturday in late March or early April. To be announced.

The Board of Directors has approved funds for the DREDGING of the pond at the back gate along with other projects to keep our storm sewers flowing. We have been told that our sewer system is well built and in good condition. The accumulation of silt and other debris where the pipes flow into the ponds and wet lands is our biggest problem. These areas will be cleared to keep the storm waters flowing, particularly in low-lying areas of the community.

We pay for each and every STREETLIGHT in the community whether it is working or not, so report any outage to the B & G or directly to Santee Cooper. All you need is the number listed on the bottom of the pole.

She learned many of her skills from her parents. Her mother was involved in needlework and sewing, which Beverly continues to enjoy. She has one bedroom that has been transformed into a beautifully equipped sewing room, and three sewing machines, each used for a different type of stitching.


Her father had a woodworking shop in a building behind the house Bev grew up in and it was there that she spent many happy hours watching and learning. He often gave her a hammer, nails and a board, and let her spend hours hammering. He made much of the furniture Beverly has in her home today, including a Grandfather clock, curio cabinet, dining room table and sideboard, and legs for a beautiful marble-topped table he found in a junkyard.

Bev teaches sewing at Quilters Heaven in Surfside Beach. She has copyrights for a number of patterns she designed, including a set of six placemats, each with a different variation of the American flag. She plans to use this design and expand it for Christmas, Valentine's Day, and other holidays. She also has copyrights for a wine bottle gift bag and a table runner. Bev does heirloom sewing, and has made a very delicate baby's Christening cap, a Victorian fork holder, and some magnificent clothes for her extensive custom-made doll collection. She also does smocking, which she has incorporated into her heirloom sewing.

While living in Richmond, Bev made two dozen complete Barbie doll wardrobes each year for the Salvation Army's Christmas Mother organization, which provided gifts to underprivileged families. on the lookout for something new!


Santas, Belschnikle Santas, fabric-dressed Father Christmas' and a beautiful set of English carolers, which are displayed on a handmade quilt.

The one in the main room was covered with wonderful glass ornaments and candy canes from Czechoslovakia, Germany and America. The dining room tree featured decorated goose, duck and hen eggs. In the sewing room were twin table trees with a patriotic motif. One bedroom tree was devoted to miniature Barbie dolls. The one in her room had handmade ornaments and ornaments collected from many vacations.


Beverly's incredible talent is most obvious in her collection of decorated eggs, all of which she did herself. The eggs are hollowed out and dried, then either painted or decoupaged and decorated. Many are delicately carved, using a drill, to form intricate designs before being decorated. A number of them have had one side cut out and tiny figurines inserted in the center. An ostrich egg, depicting 100 years of electricity, won best in show at the Thomas Edison Art contest at her office.

At one time she taught Japanese Temari (embroidery on a thread-covered ball) at the Litchfield Exchange. She is currently president of the Smockers (an Internet smocking guild) and treasurer of the Smocking Arts Guild of America. She is also involved with Sewing at the Beach, a workshop sponsored by the Stranded Smockers and Stitchers and held in North Myrtle Beach.

A visit to Bev's home is a magical experience. Every room is a tribute to her amazing skills and extensive collections. She is a very talented lady who is constantly on the lookout for something new!

WILLBROOK ROAD MAINTENANCE DISTRICT

Progress has slowed due to the holidays and winter weather in turning over the responsibility of the road surface of Willbrook Blvd. and Kings River Rd. to the County/State. Rick Ryan, the Litchfield Company Chairman of the Road District Board, is still looking for turnover to occur within the next 30-45 days. Finishing work on erecting additional speed limit signs and other minor work should allow the turnover to be completed as indicated. No major work items are at issue.

The Road Maintenance District will continue to be responsible for irrigation, mowing, flower planting and other beautification work.

Golf Tip

Here's a simple drill to help you establish the proper swing plane on your back swing and keep you from swinging too upright or too flat. From the address position, with your driver, grasp the inside of your left wrist with your right hand (for right handed players) and swing back maintaining the hold on your left wrist. Just let the club swing back naturally, without fighting where it wants to go. At the top of your back swing the club should be just above the tip of your right shoulder. If it's closer to your head, you're too upright, if it's way behind you, you're too flat.


Dear Tradition Residents:




