PARADISE LOST?

Your Covenants Committee is doing our best to advise residents who are not adhering to the guidelines agreed to at house purchase time.

Unkempt lawns are by far the majority of complaints we receive, and we cannot stress strongly enough the importance this problem has become. Our property values are not going to remain high if this continues. Prospective buyers are quickly turned off by lawns not mowed, watered, fertilized or edged with runaway hedges, weeds, etc.

Our community is no longer new and shiny, and in some cases, we regret to say, is taking on a seedy appearance. Each of our homes is only as beautiful and valuable as our neighbor's. Lack of upkeep ruins the value and pleasing appearance of the surrounding homes.

Please keep in mind that we are volunteers and have all our best interests at heart in attempting to help residents adhere to our agreed upon covenants. It is a frustrating experience to witness some of the violations in our neighborhood. In many cases we advise of a violation, find it corrected - only to discover that the correction is only temporary.

It's surprising and disappointing to get a complaint concerning a resident owner's property, but the majority of complaints are with the 20% renter/absentee owner homes. (An exception is when the owner has arranged for regular lawn service.)

Other complaints of note: rust from wells (info on web site), cats allowed off owner's property, commercial trucks and cars parked overnight, and a growing colony of statuary.

As the summer rolls onward, I hope that all Tradition Club residents are enjoying what thus far has been a pleasant season. We have had enough rain to minimize the amount of irrigation needed. I notice with satisfaction that many of our residents have been enjoying our community pool amenity and the beach. We also are fortunate to have pleasant venues nearby, including summer evenings at Brookgreen Gardens. I also urge our residents to support the Pawleys Island Arts and Music Festival events which begin the end of August and continue during September. I also hope that you will support and participate in our social events, which during the fall will include bingo at our clubhouse, a par three golf event, and an oyster roast at the Hot Fish Club in Murrells Inlet.

I hope all of our residents will continue to cooperate in keeping our neighborhood an attractive area. Make sure you read the article by our Covenants Committee and give some thought to what you can do to make their role easier by following the rules and regulations which we have. Keep in mind that the objective is to maintain our property values based on having an overall pleasant appearance of our area. Also, along the same line of thought, be sure that you obtain the approval of our Architectural Review Board for any changes to the exterior of your property, as required by the Declaration, rules and regulations. This includes additions to the house, modification of porches, sidewalks and or driveways, and significant changes to landscapes. The Covenants Committee and the Architectural Review Board meet monthly at 7:00 PM on the 2nd and 3rd Tuesdays respectively.

Some of our homes are now approaching eight years old. Look closely and you see signs of aging. Fortunately there are a great number of service businesses available to help us maintain our property. These include lawn and landscape contractors, tree removal and trimming contractors, roof mold removal contractors, and pressure wash contractors, to name a few. Ask your neighbors for a reference if you don't have a favorite contractor of your own. Please, for the sake of your own property and for the sake of our community as a whole, take care of your roof and exterior mold and dirt buildup, and also your dead trees which require removal and/or partially dead trees which require trimming. (Remember to get ARB approval for tree removal first.) If you are renting your home, and there are many who are, it is your responsibility to be aware of and follow our community rules and regulations. If there is deterioration of a ny a spect of the property, including roof mold, a dirty exterior, or land-scaping that needs help, I believe it is your civic responsibility to make the home owner aware of the need for repair, maintenance or restoration.

We are at the point in the history of The Tradition that some of our most stalwart volunteers are "burned out" and deserve to be replaced by fresh faces. These needs include Buildings & Grounds volunteers, Covenants Committee members, and ARB members. We need someone who is computer savvy to take over as editor of our quarterly newsletter, a task which Vince and Dot Franco have done very capably for some time now. We also need volunteers to take responsibility for social activities—such as outings and the annual community garage sale. In general, we applaud neighbors who care enough to pick up some stray paper or cans when they see such things around the community. HOME MAINTENANCE SUGGESTIONS

Recently the homeowners association had the roof of the clubhouse cleaned because of the buildup of mold on the surfaces. The improvement is obvious. Removal of the mold discoloration also will help lengthen the life of the roof on your house. Mr. Mildew, a.k.a. Brian Leatherman of 287 Emerson Loop, Pawleys Island (phone 237 3146) did the work.

Trees which have major dead branches at the top, or which are completely dead, are a hazard to homes when windstorms occur. The dead wood becomes increasingly brittle. Falling branches can easily pierce your roof or damage siding and windows. There are many local firms available to do trimming and removal.

The covenants committee members will be looking to advise residents who have these tree problems, and your board believes action needs to be taken to remove these hazards.

If you have hedges or bushes that are "getting away" from you, be assured that your neighbors will appreciate the trim job you give to the out of control greenery. Also be sure to weed around the bushes and mulch with pine straw or wood chips. If you can't do it yourself there are a number of service providers who would be happy to do the job pretty darn economically.

Meet Your Neighbors By Joan Murren

Barbara and Norm Nuding

Deacon Drive residents Norm Nuding, an ordained minister, and his wife Barbara, have had a wonderful life of travel and missionary work.

Norm is a World War II veteran. He traveled throughout New Guinea, Leyte, and Manila with General McArthur, working in cryptography, prior to arriving in Japan. He had heard much propaganda about the Japanese people, but to his surprise found them caring, sensitive, and intelligent.

After the war, Norm graduated from Wittenberg University, then attended the seminary to prepare for the Lutheran ministry. At the same time, Barbara was studying at Miami University. In the second year of the seminary, Norm attended a lecture about Japan given by an African missionary. Norm felt called to missionary work in Japan, but deep down hoped Barbara would not be interested. Instead, she was enthusiastic about the prospect. They were sent to Yale University for a summer of Japanese studies; then Barbara taught for a year prior to their move to the Orient in 1951.

In Japan, Norm was assigned to help develop the new Lutheran Tokyo Student Center for University students. There the Nudings helped form a congregation of baptized Christian students who became the nucleus of a group that remains active today. This congregation celebrated its fiftieth anniversary last fall. All previous ministers, including the Nudings, participated in the celebration in Japan. One of the highlights of the festivities was Norm delivering a sermon in Japanese!

It was expected that the Nudings would spend the remainder of their lives in Japan, returning to the states for a one year period following each five year period overseas. However, after 16 years Norm was called back to Lutheran headquarters in New York City where he served as a Personnel Director and Secretary for Europe in the Overseas Division. In the latter position he traveled to many interesting cities, including Moscow, Warsaw, Helsinki and Berlin. He stayed in this position for 20 years. The reentry into American culture was the most traumatic experience of Barbara's life. She had never shopped at a supermarket, or used a credit card, and felt total isolation. They were both shocked at the racial unrest and the drug problems in the U.S. Norm eventually initiated a re-entry program for missionary adults and children who returned from overseas experiences.

After returning to the United States with four sons in tow, the Nudings settled in Princeton, NJ where earlier Norm had earned his Masters Degree in Systematic Theology. Barbara completed her Bachelor's degree at Trenton State College and her Master of Arts in Educational Administration from Rider College. She taught in various schools and was invited by the University of Quebec to teach mathematics methods to Cree Indian teachers. Barbara was appointed to represent the State of New Jersey at a metric education conference that led to her appointment as Mathematics Consultant in the NJ Dept. of Education. She was appointed to a US Dept. of Education committee on national testing and implementing Mathematics Standards for the United States.

One of Barbara's most prized possessions is her cello. It has traveled with her all over the world, has been broken in transport, and successfully refurbished. Her cello sits proudly in her home today.

At the request of his children, Norm recounted his life experiences on 17 CDs. This project took him two years. Barbara is currently Chairman of the Volunteer Board of Directors of the Georgetown Chapter of the American Red Cross.

The Nudings life experiences and accomplishments are many and varied, but their proudest accomplishments are their four sons, all of whom are college graduates and very successful in their chosen fields. After living all over the world, they are happy to call Pawleys Island their home.

Golf Tip

Here's the "Tip of the Month"

A proper back swing weight shift is essential yet difficult to do properly. It's not so much a shift as it is a turn. To turn effectively, keep your lower body quiet (think "stand on ice") and allow your upper body to coil against the resistance of the lower body. You may feel as if you've shortened your back swing but in actuality you will be creating a more powerful, compact turn. Remember, keep the lower body quiet on the back swing.




TRADITION LADIES GOLF ASSOCIATION By Betty Ruff

WILLBROOK ROAD MAINTENANCE DISTRICT by Dick Albright

The "final" inspection by Georgetown County prior to assuming maintenance responsibility for the road surfaces took place in mid June. As a result, several discrepancies were noted which must be corrected before transfer can occur. St. Paul's Place in front of the fire station requires some fill and drain cover work. Just past St Paul's Place on Willbrook Blvd., additional fill and paving material is required. Also, a hole has developed on Willbrook Blvd just west of the new middle school road. This was caused by an irrigation pipe leak and must be filled and paved over. On King's River Rd in the vicinity of Monarch Court, some ditch work is needed to eliminate storm water problems. A contract has been let and work should begin in the near future. The "final" inspection will follow the completion of the latest discrepancy work. Survey work is also in progress to clearly define the road right of way and property lines.


