Homestead Exemption by Howard and Claudia Krauth

There are certain good benefits to becoming 65 years of age aside from Medicare. The Homestead Exemption Program would be one. Once you reach 65, you need to apply for this at the County Auditors Office in Georgetown. You will need proof of eligibility if applying due to age. Bring your birth certificate, Medicaid card, Medicare card, or driver's license. If you are applying due to disability, you will need to present documentation from the state or federal agency certifying the disability. If you are applying because of blindness, you will need to present documentation from an ophthalmologist registered with the SC Commission for the blind. Other pertinent information is available from the County Auditors Office in Georgetown.

Scrapbocking





Golf Tip by Steve Dresser **PGA Professional Director Tradition Golf School**

Here's the "Tip of the Month"

A Stronger Left Hand Grip Equals Stronger Shots.

If you're suffering from a lack of zip in your shots, it might help if you strengthen the position of your left hand on the club. Many tour players hold the club in a stronger position today than they did 20 years ago. A stronger left hand means holding the club more in the fingers and getting the handle under the heel pad. The thumb will be right of center on the shaft and 3 knuckles will be visible as you look down at your hands from your set up position. Doing this should allow your thumb to support the club at the top of the back swing and encourage your hands, wrists and arms to "release" the club through impact. A word of warning, you can overdo this and hit low hooks, but don't be afraid to experiment a bit. If you need a little help with this, stop by the golf school and I'll show you what I mean. Good Luck.

Building and Grounds Committee By Walt Murren

By the time this newsletter is delivered I will have completed two years as chairman of the Building & Grounds Committee. It has been a rewarding experience for me not only because I was able to give some of my time to this wonderful community in which we live, but because in doing so I have come in contact with and worked with so many good people from the community.

The past two years have been very busy. During this period we took over the control of our common properties from Centex. Before Centex left, the Board of Directors and Building & Grounds were able to get them to replace many broken curbs and sinkholes in the storm sewer system. The open spaces were not in good shape and required the installation of nine irrigation systems and the upgrade of another. Sod had to be placed on all the areas and plants placed around the irrigation pumps. The reserves to cover the future cost of repairing or replacing our roads, buildings and other facilities had to be updated to insure that funds would be available when needed. The back pond was dredged and improvements to the storm sewer system were made. The front fountain was rebuilt and a new fountain installed in the back pond. A gate was constructed at the entrance to the back pump station to soften the view. Bricks were placed around all our signposts to protect them and then they were cleaned and painted. The clubhouse furniture was reupholstered and card table chairs have been replaced. New doors were installed on each side of the clubhouse and the roof extended to protect them.

Many people have been involved in these projects and more. Monitoring irrigation systems, repairing sprinkler heads, maintaining the fountains, repairing tennis courts, painting signs, planting flowers, and changing light bulbs. The list goes on and on. Help is always welcome.

I will be stepping down as Chairman as of February 1st. I will continue on as a member of the committee as there are still projects I would like to see completed. The committee lost a valuable member recently with the resignation of Howard Krauth. There was no one involved in more of these projects than Howard. My heartfelt thanks for all he has done. Ron Brugge is returning to the committee after a term on the Board of Directors and will be the new Chairman. His knowledge of the community is unequaled and he is dedicated to keeping this a great place to live. All the members of the committee welcome him back and look forward to working with him.

Willbrook Road Maintenance District By Dick Albright

The Road District is still awaiting the County's final acceptance of responsibility for the road surface maintenance. One delay is the discussion between the County and Litchfield Co. (not the Road District) with regard to responsibility for St. Paul Place, which runs by the Fire House to the Methodist Church. At issue is responsibility for the road if the County approves an extension and connection of St. Paul's Place to the Exchange and BI-LO property. Final disposition is contingent on approval of the connection. A few "pot holes" have developed and will be filled as soon as we get a break in the weather. For the 2003 Budget expected revenues are \$147,000, operating, repair and electrical expenses \$132,000 and reserves for capital improvements \$15,000. Accrued reserves to date are \$46,500.

Friday Night Bridge News By Danny Phillips


