The Board of Directors (BOD) and I hope everyone enjoyed a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. I want to thank all the volunteers who decorated the association's common properties with seasonal decorations. I also noticed many more homes than in past years decorated with lights, wreaths, ornaments, etc. I would be remiss if I did not mention our neighbors, who met on a cold night, and traveled throughout the Tradition singing Christmas carols. Thanks for a great job everyone.

In the last newsletter I asked for volunteers to fill two openings on the Architectural Review Board. I am pleased to announce that two of our residents have agreed to join this very necessary committee. Again, our very talented residents have stepped forward when needed.

The BOD has approved major projects for 2005, and they are reflected on the last page of the budget in the restricted reserve fund. They consist of resurfacing the west side of the entrance bridge, resurfacing the tennis courts, painting the exterior of the pool house and purchasing heavier tables for the pool deck. We have also contracted an engineering firm to advise and guide us through the maintenance of our roadways. This includes seal coating and repaving. They will help us determine when and if any of our roads are in need of seal coating or paving. I have been asked by some of the residents if our roads need work at this time. This is why we have contracted professionals, not tied in with seal coating or repaving contractors, to give us professional guidance in how we proceed. The timetables shown in the reserve budget are not set in stone, and we will only spend these monies when it is to our benefit over the long term.

In our first meeting following the Annual Homeowners meeting, I will be asking the BOD to set a list of goals for 2005 that will include the projects I listed above and a review of both our operating budget and our reserve fund. Both of these budgets were created years ago and are now becoming more realistic as we move aggressively to maintain our common properties.

Lastly, I would like to invite everyone to attend the ANNUAL HOMEOWNERS' MEETING in February at the new Coastal Carolina University building across from the firehouse. It is extremely important that you return your proxy votes. If we do not reach a quorum for the meeting, it will be necessary to have a second mailing, at association expense, to meet the covenant requirements. Hope to see all homeowners at the meeting.

ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW BOARD

Let me first introduce myself. My name is Vince Civitarese, and I am the new chairperson for the ARB. I reside at 57 Monarch Court. My phone number is 237-3568. I have lived in The Tradition for two years.

The ARB consists of five members. Their names, addresses and phone numbers are as follows:

Since the board consists of approximately 80% new members, we have spent time trying to reorganize and streamline the ARB procedures for the owners to obtain permits in accordance with our Covenants. A few changes have been made in these procedures to make it easier for the board to process all requests for permits. **These changes will take effect February 1, 2005**. I will outline them as follows:

- 1. All applications must be in the hands of a board member two weeks before our regular meeting, which is the 3rd Tuesday of each month.
- 2. All necessary forms must be filled out completely, as clearly explained on the application form, and a copy of a plat or plot plan <u>must</u> accompany the application. The plat must show the location of the house and all easements.

If ARB applications received by the board are not properly filled out, and all the required attachments are not received, the board will table the application review until they receive a complete application submittal.

NOTE: There seem to be some cases in which owners do not have a plat plan in their possession. In order to help eliminate the problem, copies of the plats can be obtained at ETS Engineering at Pawleys Business Center. Their phone number is 237-3002.

- 3. A new form has been added to the application that is called the Contractors Form. This form should be filed with all applications. You should fill out as much of this form a possible before your submission.
- 4. This item is not a change but from now on will be closely followed due to a legal requirement. Our Covenants require that we notify the golf course management of any changes made to properties bordering on the golf course. They have 10 days to respond to this notice. This means that a permit cannot be issued until that time period has passed. Please allow extra time when submitting you applications.

In addition to the above items, the B.O.D. has instructed us that any request for the removal of more than two trees must be brought to the B.O.D. directly.

This board is looking forward to serving you in anyway we can. If you need help filling out your application or if you have any questions, please contact one of the ARB members. Please remember we are here to help maintain the high standards established for The Tradition. Thank you.

COVENANTS COMMITTEE

Three issues of concern that are still outstanding have been brought to the attention of the Covenants Committee. They are:

- 1. Overnight Parking. All vehicles need to be in the driveway or garaged during the night hours.
- 2. <u>Trash Cans.</u> Trash receptacles are required to be put away a reasonable time after pick up.
- 3. Roof Mold.

In addition to "MR. MILDEW" (Office: 843-237-3146; Cell: 843-995-2934), Covenant Committee member Phil Fleiss received a formula from the GAF Materials Corporation for do-it-yourself:

- 1. 4 gallons water
- 2. 1 gallon household bleach
- 3. 1 cup Trisodium Phosphate (TSP)

TSP is a mild detergent that may be found at most hardware stores and home centers.

Pour the solution down the roof or use a low pressure spray (DO NOT pressure wash shingles). Allow the solution to sit 15 – 20 minutes and rinse. Repeat as necessary.

Building and Grounds Committee

As I look around our neighborhood I see not only our residents getting older, but I realize how much it takes to maintain our buildings and grounds from getting the look of age. Our infrastructure is in constant need of repair and updating so it doesn't get that tired old look that you see in some older developments. This requires a lot of work and a great deal of monies. Over one half of our dues goes to maintaining our areas' facilities.

To cite a few examples:

- Last year Buildings and Grounds spent in excess of \$1,200 on sprinkler parts. Thanks to volunteers we did not have to pay for installation which would have cost several thousand dollars.
- Our tennis courts are cracking and will become a potential hazard if we don't repair them. This project will take place in March at a cost of \$9,900.
- The incoming side of our main entrance roadway is cracking, and it will be replaced with concrete pavers this Spring. The cost for this project will exceed \$11,000.
- Last year we had a few of those things called HURRICANES. This added to our expense to the tune of \$9,850. We not only had to pick up from the common areas but remove debris for homeowners. This was well worth the cost.

As you can readily see by the above, it takes a huge amount of monies and volunteer manpower to keep our facilities looking like they did when we first moved in, young, fresh and new.

We intend to sealcoat some of our roads this spring. A few residents have questioned this, but according to an engineer that we hired, and a wealth of additional positive data, it will add years to the life of the pavement and is well worth the monies spent.

I talk often about volunteers, as they are a godsend because of all the work they do. In this issue you will find two of our residents that are being honored for all the work they do for my committee. They are Bob Thompson and Tom Ellison. Both Bob and Tom have helped with repairing the irrigation system. Bob was instrumental in selecting and watching over the painter for the interior of the clubhouse. Tom worked diligently on finding a contractor to repair the tennis courts. These are just a couple of the projects that they worked on. To list them all I would fill up the rest of this newsletter.

Hope to see you in April when we get together for the annual cleanup. The date will be announced.

With completion of the turnaround at the entrance to Willbrook Country Club and the Reserve, we are down to one item from the Georgetown County punch list. The last item is replacement of about 40 feet of road surface in front of the Midway Firehouse on St Paul's Place. The contract for this work has been let, and we are now awaiting work to start. The lawyers have drafted the Transfer Deed and on completion of the last work item, the agreement will be signed by the Road District Board President.

It should be noted that although the county has overall responsibility for the road surface, the Road District retains authority to make emergency repairs as necessary (e.g.,potholes). There has been some concern expressed regarding the Willbrook Blvd. curb cuts to enter/exit the new Mingo development behind the Piggly Wiggly. The Road District Board of Directors will have representation on the Willbrook Plantation ARB when Mingo's presents their detailed development plan.




"Page Turners" Book Club


Tip Of the Month

If you haven't noticed, Tradition Club has a fair amount of fairway bunkers! Should your shot happen to venture into one of them, don't panic, it's not all that difficult to escape. First, check your lie. If you're in a footprint, cut your losses and just get it back on the fairway. Secondly, check the trajectory needed. Be sure to use plenty of loft to get over the lip. If you can't hit it high enough, see the instructions for getting out of a footprint! To set up for the shot, position the ball in the center of your stance and work your feet into the sand about one inch. Distribute your weight so it slightly favors the left side, for a right handed player. On the backswing keep the feet planted and the legs quiet. Make a little bit shorter swing than normal and focus on trying to hit the ball first, then the sand. It's a lot like hitting the ball from turf in that your "divot" should happen after contact with the ball. Your follow through will be a little restricted because it's a little harder to turn through to the target so guard against pulling the shot to the left. Be sure to use a club you're comfortable with. If you're using an iron, I wouldn't suggest any more than a 5 iron. The high – lofted woods and "rescue" style clubs work great for these shots. The bottom line to this shot is hitting the ball first on the downswing, rather than trying to pick it perfectly clean.

A couple words of advice, if you're in the sand to the right of #3 or the left of #10, just get it back in the fairway!


