The Vote: A 75% quorum of property owners responded. "Yes" votes exceeded the 67% requirement in our bylaws. Following two months of negotiating improvements to the original contract, The Tradition board voted its approval to commence service on January 1, 2019. You may review the Spectrum Proposal online at www.Tradition29585.com. The home page displays a link to details.

The Process: Each property owner's name and address will be furnished to Spectrum, who then will provide to the board instructions as to what each resident must do with their current equipment prior to January 1. As soon as the Spectrum instructions are received by the BOD, you will be notified about how to proceed. Please watch your email for the coming updates!

ARB and Covenants Guidelines

When a home/property is purchased in The Tradition, the new owner receives a booklet: the Architectural Review Board and Covenants Guidelines. Work has begun to review, update, and clarify the content of these documents in an effort to improve readability and understanding of our community's guidelines and rules (for example: our current pool rules refer to the use of "radios," which will be updated to reflect today's terminology, "digital media"). Additionally, changes may be suggested to maintain or enhance our property values in an ever-changing real estate market. Most Tradition homes sell quickly, even when selling prices increase dramatically, as they have in recent years. Yes, our beach access is an enviable amenity, but it is our community of owners who take pride in their properties and neighborhoods that makes The Tradition a highly sought-after address.



The original *Guidelines* were published in 2001, with subsequent Amendments in 2009, 2013, and 2014. Work on the update will take most of 2019 to complete.

Please note: All suggested changes to our ARB/ Covenants Guidelines will be reviewed by our attorney and then, if required, voted on by all property owners.

Our former property manager, Mitzi Carley has moved on from her job at Kuester. The Kuester office will be our contact point as they proceed to find a new manager for The Tradition.

Regime Fees (aka "Dues")

By early December, a letter from me will arrive in your mail-box detailing the 2019 Regime Fees, which will include the new Spectrum charge, as well as any increases to our Operating and Reserve Budgets. Owners of Rental properties: Monthly regime fees are charged to you, the property owner (not to your renter). You, the property owner, are responsible for payment of those fees to Kuester Management.

Wind, rain, flooding, sandbags, and evacuation were the topic of conversation for much of September here in the low country.


While most of us fared fairly well as we avoided the dire flood warnings, the folks here at the LBF were anxiously waiting the fate of our palms and shrubs.



As we enter the Holiday Season, with its cooler weather, great football and less crowds, let's all be thankful for our many blessings and all that living at Litchfield by the Sea affords us. It's truly my favorite time in Pawleys Island!

Tom Leis, LBTS Chairman of the Security Committee reports that our TEM based security system, which has now been installed for over two years, continues to perform in the manner that we all expected. Other than occasional system glitches, the system is performing well.



Following an exhaustive financial review of our Reserve Study and Operating Budget by the newly formed Finance Committee, the Board at LBTS has finalized the 2019 Budget. As we mentioned at the Annual Meeting in June, the funding of LBTS infrastructure tops the list of our priorities.

Many of us take for granted the day to day operation and beauty of our slice of heaven called Litchfield by the Sea... Whether it be roads, landscaping, ponds, sidewalks, fountains, bulkheads, sewers, security, beach crossovers or our beach house and decks... Your Board and our Management Company, Waccamaw Management are working to keep LBTS among the top Beach Resort Communities.



All of this takes a financial commitment by us all. The LBTS Board is mindful of this and strives to find savings and efficiencies where we can without diminishing the WOW Factor that we've all come to expect. We also seek to protect the property values of all LBTS Owners through the maintenance of our amenities to the highest standards.

To fund our Operating Budget, Planned Capital Expenditures, and Reserves for 2019 there will be a 6% increase in monthly dues and the Board has called for a one-time Special Assessment in January equal to 10% of everyone's Annual Dues (\$122 for all Oceanside Communities and River Club and \$42 for all other residents.) To avoid future Special Assessments, the Board will be exploring other ways to raise revenues to maintain our infrastructure and healthy Reserves going forward.

Perhaps, we should rethink road trips. Last January we took a road trip to Florida and found ourselves in a Red Cross shelter overnight (but that's a whole other story).



Analogy #2: There were a number of old rice field areas which could handle a large amount of water without overflowing.

Analogy #3: There are a number of Golf Courses on the west side of Kings River Rd which could also accept a large amount of water. (Aeration helps). "






SPRING GARAGE SALE






THE MEN'S CLUB BY BILL RENAULT





Cardiovascular Disease (CVD) The #1 Killer




Today I want to discuss the number one cause of death in the world. Cardiovascular Disease. CVD causes 30% of all mortality in the world. It consists of heart attacks, stroke, blood clots, heart failure, and many other disorders of blood vessels. 90% of CVD deaths can be prevented.

Some of the risk factors for CVD include family history, age, sex, tobacco use, sedentary lifestyle, and high fat diet. Routine screening for CVD with yearly ECGs in low risk patients have not been effective. In 2013, the American Heart Association (AHA) and American College of Cardiology (ACC) created cardiovascular prevention guidelines to help assess the risk for a cardiovascular event.

These guidelines include lifestyle modifications to reduce the risk of CVD, recommendations to management of high cholesterol, and management of increased body weight. These organizations developed a risk calculator to estimate the 10-year risk for atherosclerotic cardiovascular disease (ASCVD). Information used in the calculation includes age, race, sex, total cholesterol, HDL cholesterol, blood pressure, presence of hypertension, diabetes status, and tobacco usage. You can calculate your own risk at www.cvriskcalculator.com.

AHA/ACC recommends moderate to high dose statin use in any patient with an ASCVD risk of 7.5% or greater. "Statins" is a class of drugs that lowers the level of cholesterol in the blood by reducing the production of cholesterol by the liver. If ASCVD risk is greater than 10%, the addition of low dose aspirin 81mg is also indicated. This calculator is only accurate for ages 40-79. There is some debate whether statin therapy in patients over age 79 is beneficial.





Please note that lifestyle modification is just as important as statin therapy in high risk groups. Controlling blood pressure, improving cholesterol, and stopping smoking will all lower ASCVD risk. It is important to calculate your risk even if you have a low or normal cholesterol level. I have found many patients with normal lipid panels to have very high risk, and I have found patients with high cholesterol to have very low risk.

These high-risk patients would benefit from a statin, and the low risk patients can avoid starting statin therapy. This is the main point I want to hammer home. Know what your ASCVD risk is, and discuss with your primary care provider if a statin would benefit you. As always, following a healthy lifestyle with low fat diet and regular exercise remains important.
